## SITES OF MEANING Marker Stones for the Millennium

### **EDUCATIONAL PACK - PRIMARY**

### **General Information**

Sites of Meaning was a millennium project of Middleton and Smerrill in the Derbyshire Peak. The project marked the seventeen entrances to its parish with inscribed boundary stones. Much of the activity had an educational focus and included two projects with Youlgrave Primary School - the Sculpture Residency and Other Stones - Other Meanings where the school worked with artists, writers, archaeologists and educationalists. A later project, InscribeNOW, involved secondary schools and local colleges in developing publicity material for Sites of Meaning. This pack is designed for teachers, lecturers or students who may be visiting the area and is based on our experience gained in those projects.

### Visiting Middleton

Middleton is a small village but large parish. However, many of the *Sites of Meaning* marker stones, plus other sites of interest are easily visited from the centre of the village or Youlgrave. More distant stones and places of interest such as Arbor Low need transport.

Facilities are limited – Middleton has no shops or pubs – but a useful shed can be found at the end of the children's playground in the main square and there are public toilets. Parking is not normally a problem except at busy weekends. The Youlgrave Website provides lists of local services and places to stay.

Well Dressing week (Spring Bank Holiday) is an excellent time to visit Middleton when the village throngs with visitors and there is the well dressing to see. But if you come the week before you'll be able to see the well dressing boards being prepared by a team of villagers.

### Primary school visit to Bradford Dale

This pack is designed to help Primary Schools enjoy and maximise visits to Bradford Dale. It builds up information for a subsequent creative writing session. It suggests a route, places to visit and things to do, and identifies *Sites of Meaning* resources for your visit.

The Bradford Dale sites are within easy reach of both Middleton and Youlgrave and this walk takes in a number of interesting sites besides the marker stones. Water is a commonly recurring theme and a prepared notebook is included to record children's responses to each site.

We explored Bradford Dale extensively with Youlgrave Primary School during *Other Stones – Other Meanings*. The children documented their experience in the dale with cameras and in notebooks before returning and writing poems with David Fine. The poems were later exhibited during the 2004 village well dressing and lines from poems were used for *Sites of Meaning* marker stones. The route includes two stones with text written by the children.

### The Route

The circuit starts in Middleton Square (ample parking including coaches), travels along the road to Youlgrave (light traffic), drops down from Roughwood Hollow into Bradford Dale (heavily wooded), carries up the river into Rowlow Dale (open fields, cattle in summer), and returns by Lowfield and Weaddow Lanes (very light traffic) to the village.

The circuit could be started by walking up Bradford Dale from Youlgrave. For younger children the route could be shortened, returning to the village after the Sheep Dip or the Clapper Bridge, both routes shown on the map.
